Facts about the City Impacting On-street Parking Conditions

High Population Density (US Census)

- South Gate 13,000 Residents Per Square Mile (2014)
- Los Angeles County 2,449 Residents Per Square Mile

Automobile Dependency

- In South Gate, 38% of households have 3 vehicles or more
- In L.A. County, 15.5% of households have 3 vehicles or more


Common Issues

- Driveways are narrow and underutilized
- Garages are converted to living quarters
- Businesses park on residential streets
- Unpermitted businesses in homes
- Illegal parking of vehicles in front of fire hydrants, driveways, etc.
- Residents reserve parking on City streets, by blocking off two parking spaces with one vehicle

Public Streets

- On-street Parking Capacity is over 31,000 parking spaces, however, over
 53,000 vehicles registered in the City
- Need for more alternative modes of transportation like bike lanes, passenger light rail and public transit.
