



**CALL TO ORDER** Al Rios, Mayor called a Special City Council Meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

**SOLID WASTE MGMT** The City Council heard a presentation by HF&H Consultants, LLC. ("HF&H") along with staff relating to the initial evaluation of the solid waste services proposals received from USA Waste of California, Inc. (Waste Management), Universal Waste Systems, Inc., and NASA Services, Inc. Upon the conclusion of the presentations by HF&H, the submitting proposers, and comments from the public, the City Council will consider giving direction on further negotiations with a single vendor or multiple vendors as well as general areas to be discussed with those selected vendors.

Vice Mayor Avalos made a motion to continue negotiations with all three vendors and Council member Davila seconded the motion.

**Roll Call:** Council Member Diaz, yes; Council Member Davila, yes; Vice Mayor Avalos, yes; Mayor Rios, yes; Council Member Hurtado, recused

A Statement from Council Member Hurtado was read into the record. Council Member Hurtado is recusing himself from this meeting in an abundance of caution until he receives formal advice from the FPPC (Fair Political Practice Committee). He has asked the commission if he can participate in the selection of a vendor for the City's disposal operations as one of the proposed company's is close to his residency. Council Member Hurtado will not participate in the meeting but will be listening. The Council meeting proceeded with four council members.

Debbie Morris, HF&H Consultants provided a presentation on the process of the project.

Vice Mayor Avalos asked if currently we are providing the service of litter container collection and oil filtration program. She also wanted to know what the cost for the current litter collection and the oil filtration system that we have in place.

Art Cervantes, Director of Public Works responded that yes, these services are already in place, and are more cost effective than recycling. The current cost is somewhere over 11 thousand dollars compared to what is being proposed and is unaware of the cost for the oil filtration system as it is provided to the entire region with the city being the host.

Council Member Diaz inquired on the salary range of the workers (including drivers) and if they are unionized? Also, she is big on quality and sustainable jobs that have a purchasing home power because they sometimes become members of the community.

Ms. Morris reported that NASA and UWS are non-union, and Waste Management is unionized.

Council Member Davila stated that she believes community engagement is very important. She wants to be sure that whichever company is chosen that they are willing to be involved with the community.

Judy Gregory provided the presentation from NASA. The owners and general manager were present. They discussed the history, development, services, and industry experience of the company. They have had smooth and successful experiences with transitioning with new contracts. Ms. Gregory explained the services they offer. NASA has the disposal capacity of over 150 thousand tons per year guaranteed of disposal capacity dedicated solely to South Gate. Also, a guaranteed diversion rate of 40%, new carts, bins, vehicles, equipment throughout, and SB939 compliant program. NASA also meets the requirement for organic procurement for SB1833 and all additional programs that are required and outlined in the proposal. They have worked closely with food generating businesses and have helped set up food donation programs with clients that divert 1.2 pounds of edible food that goes to those that need it most. They understand the new SB1388 regulations "inside and out", they have been meeting with cities to fulfill the regulations and be the best.

In terms of proposal enhancements, Ms. Morris discussed some of the things that they are providing to the schools and community (educational opportunities), they are open to other programs and suggestions from City staff and Council. Also, if the City wants to bundle other services that where not included in proposal, they are open to that and other negotiations, as well as open to rebalancing the rate so that it can best serve the city.

Mark Blackburn, President of UWS presented the company's history and description of operations in California, New Mexico, and Arizona. He discussed customer service experiences and operations. They have a team of fifteen that make sure that everyone is onboarded properly, receive proper service and training for the new programs. He presented that transition plan and how they envision the plan rolling out and explained a few of their software programs that they use to exchange information, track deliveries or exchanges and monitor driver safety.

To conclude his presentation, they offered to raise the host fee and tipping fee at local facility by one dollar a ton. They have offered to turn the South Gate office to a full-service center facility for the residents to make payments, ask questions and concerns. They offer a five-thousand-dollar scholarship program for the local schools and minimum of twenty thousand dollars a year in sponsorship money for City events. They also have a liquid waste division, which offers free portable toilets and sinks for events. Lastly, they offer a driving program where they pay to help train local South Gate residents to become drivers.

Mike Hammers new area Vice President and President of USA Waste of California began their presentation with the resources they have in California include, multiple recycling facilities, landfills, and they have multiple organic divergent facilities that allow them to handle the City's needs.

Mr. Hammers introduced Eric Contero who explained scholarship opportunities and other local investments that can help the community of South Gate.

Mr. Hammers explained their approach for a solution regarding illegal dumping, such as, access to facility locations so that residents can dump bulky items. In terms of carbon footprint, having a local facility allows them to reduce the number of miles they drive to dump trash. They do not have to travel outside of the city to dispose of recycling, organics, or trash. They will be committing an additional \$200 thousand dollars a year in host fees on top of contractual fees to the city. That equals up to 6 million dollars over the ten-year period. This can help the City's General Funds and provide youth programs, maintenance, and other type of development within the city.

USA Waste of California plans to have an active social media presence to learn from customers, this also allows them to do better and train their drivers. They will have a full website about recycling and one website is specifically tailored to the City of South Gate. The launch of the W11 app will allow for people to order containers, check when trash and recycling is going to be picked up and can receive education about the services they provide.

Mr. Hammers introduced Armando Bracamontes who is the district manager and will be presenting the next slides. Mr. Bracamontes discussed the opportunity for hiring locally, if given contract they would be able to open new job roles.

Rodolfo Mata, Waste Management Employee, stated that he has worked for Waste Management for seventeen years after leaving the military and servicing the City of South Gate for five years.

South Gate resident is concerned about these companies going bankrupt and explained that there was a trash company that went bankrupt many years ago and stopped collecting. He is not pushing any company but enjoyed the presentations and looks forward to visiting a few of the facilities to make sure they are what they say they are.

Hector Ramirez is a shop steward and stated that he likes the respect that is given in South Gate as driver. Every morning they have huddles where they talk about the safety of customers and their employees.

Marco Furias, Waste Management Employee, stated that he has children that go to South Gate High School, and he has worked for Waste Management for over twenty years and emphasized that the company spends money to make sure that they are teaching safety for the children, residents, and other people that are in the area.

Virginia Johnson would like to see more philanthropy from USA Waste Management but the cost to the residents is the most important aspect of the waste hauling contract. She pointed out that NASA had three legal violations. One was a 209, 216, and 221 and is hoping that they are resolved. The neighbors of UWS have been complaining about the smell for the past five years. Lastly Ms. Johnson stated that the current waste company (USA Waste Management) has been providing great service and good customer service and believes that they do a good job of fulfilling new waste laws.

Mario Dominguez was very impressed with UWS's presentation. Waste management is very good all year but when it comes to holidays, they are a mess, they give residents a day where trash pickup is postponed a day to give workers a break but after the day, they pick up trash and still show up on the scheduled pick-up day to pick up trash. The next day, they say they are going to pick up recycling but then they forget, and they service some streets but not others. He says there is a lack of communications during the holidays and that during the presentation no one discussed e-waste (laptop, desktop, phones). He suggested that Council should consider which company is going to give residents a decent and fair price.

Jerry Brown is a member of the South Gate Chamber of Commerce and stated that Waste Management is a great service, and they are involved in the community.

Thomas Buckley, South Gate resident, feels that there is a connection between South Gate residents and US Waste Management. He stated that a child who had autism wanted to drive and see what the trash trucks can do, and they gave him a VIP tour of the truck. He explained that US Waste Management is the only hauler with experience in South Gate and experience is priceless.

Rene Galvez resident of South Gate for ten-years, stated that his experience with Waste Management has always been great even when they called for bulky item pick up. Also, like that they give back to the community and fundraise for Southeast High School athletic teams and donate toys during the holidays.

Robert Montalvo stated that presentations were great and thinks that Waste Management is the logical choice. They hold a lot of events in the city and the work they put into the community is amazing.

Erwin Salmeron supports Waste Management, and they are a great service for South Gate.

Elizbeth Zamora supports Waste Management and is proud of the work they have done in the city. Her father is also an employee which makes her also proud.

Greg stated that with waste management they have been very good to the community in many ways, they have decent trucks, reliable pick-ups, green trucks that cause less pollution, and they give and grow with the community.

Ennet Vialobo, Waste Management employee for twenty-eight years and district manager stated that during her years working for Waste Management, she has seen the technology and service change as well as diversity and empowerment. She is proud to work for waste management and hopes they can continue servicing for the community.

Chris Jeffers, City Manager explained the importance of transparency and having council meetings to present the information to the public.

Ms. Morris responded to an audience question that E-waste is included in bulky item pick up.

Vice Mayor Avalos acknowledged each of the presenters on their presentations. Her priorities are minimizing customer rates both residential and commercial. Customer service is also key because we have multigenerational families and seniors (some have disabilities/hard of hearing). Therefore, great customer service is key. Lastly maximizing recycling and divergence compliance we must make sure that the city is complying with what the State requires. Waste management has been great, but enhancements were offered when city was emerging an RFP, this should be done year-round. Community involvement is important, but customer rates and service are very important along with compliance.

Council Member Diaz thanked all the residents for attending and thanked all the employees of the refuse companies for their work during COVID. She clarified that e-waste is included in the bulky item pick-up and that community involvement especially with the youth is important.

Council Member Davila thanked each vendor for being part of the process. She stated that rates are important because South Gate has a lot of working-class families and multiple families in one home. One thing she would like to see is an annual shredding event because there are so many documents, and they are just thrown in the trash. It is also important for businesses to participate in the community. Waste Management has done a lot of services for the community with toy drives and food give aways during COVID. Council Member Davila also thanked the refuse employees for their work during the pandemic.

Council Member Hurtado explained that the city is familiar with what Waste Management has to offer and hopes that the new vendors can provide new trucks that produce less pollution. He expressed concern for supply change because of the time limit, he is unsure if the chosen vendor will have enough time to gear up fast enough to start in January. Another concern is if the vendors have the capacity to deliver the service they are offering. He would like to hear more on how they weigh customer experience, service, and rate. Also, he explained that this meeting was to get public comment, hear from vendors, and to give some direction to staff in terms of moving forward. Council Member Hurtado would like to work with all three vendors and asked for opinions from other council members.

Vice Mayor Avalos asked if the moratorium is now lifted.

Mayor Rios answered yes now that we have had the public outreach. We will contact the vendors and facilities so that they can best represent the service they provide.

On item 1(a), City Council received an update with respect to recent court victory in that case and in favor of the City of South Gate.
